Pam Kirkham has commented "I'm sure I will be known as the virtual Mayor in the years to come".




As the UK successfully vaccinates almost half the population against COVID-19, the time comes for the vaccination programme at Nantwich Civic Hall to close.

From November 2020 it was full stream ahead for plans to bring the vaccination scheme to the Civic Hall and from 7 January 2021 the doors opened to welcome its first recipients.

Since then the team of over 160 from Nantwich & Rural PCN Practices, GP Alliance, Cheshire CCG, NHS England, Royal Voluntary Service, TempRe, Lloyd Cook Internal Risk, Cheshire East Council, Nantwich Buddies and Town Council have worked tirelessly to roll out the programme.

When they closed in June, 22018 vaccinations had been administered at the centre with over 2400 hours volunteered by 51 Nantwich Buddies.



Public Conveniences - Future Consultation

As many Nantwich residents will be aware, at one time there were public toilets on the Snowhill Car Park in the centre of the Town. In 2012 the Town Council took over ownership and management of the Snowhill toilets and due to their condition, the toilets were later closed. Over recent years the Town Council has considered options to re-introduce a toilet provision in this location.

In November 2020, the Town contracted two public convenience providers to undertake an assessment on the former public toilet facility at Snowhill. The intent was to assess the structure of the building and provide recommendations and design options for replacement or refurbishment.

In the Autumn Nantwich Town Council will be inviting its residents and local businesses to take part in and complete an online survey on whether there should be investment at the former Snowhill site to re-introduce public conveniences.

In May 2021 as a result of a national increase in litter dropping, Nantwich Town Council launched a campaign alongside Keep Britain Tidy's 'Great British Spring Clean' to encourage residents and visitors not to drop litter.

Posters and banners with a 'Dabber's Don't Drop' slogan were displayed around the town, supported by posts on social media, as a reminder not to drop litter.

The Council are keen to emphasise that tackling litter is not just about one campaign though, it is about sustained action to tackle litter and change behaviour over time. Therefore, the Council contacted schools to join the campaign by educating young people about the impact of litter dropping on our town and environment.

The Council are working on a number of initiatives to help combat litter issues and will continue to work closely with and support the voluntary litter groups in the town.

If you are keen to join a litter picking group, head over to Nantwich Litter Action on Facebook, and find out more about the work they do.

We live in a beautiful town. It is for all of us to keep Nantwich clean and green!

It has been great to see schools recognising the importance of the issues around litter and supporting the campaign.

Rob Parish, Head Teacher at Millfields said: "At Millfields, we are extremely proud of our school and the wider community of Nantwich. We regularly have children from Year 6 who volunteer for litter picking duty on school grounds and our Year 5 children have also become involved in the community.

When we heard about the 'Dabbers Don't Drop' campaign, we shared it in our assembly and some of our Year 5 children have taken an active role in Nantwich itself, to help make sure our local community stays litter free."

Community Grants

As part of its commitment to local community and voluntary organisations the Town Council offers grants and donations to support local groups, activities and events. There are three different types of grants available including:

Donations to local organisations

Each year the Town Council decides to donate money to environmental groups, cultural organisations and other community societies.

Grants up to £500

Applications for small grants up to £500 are invited throughout the year and are awarded subject to budget at the discretion of the Finance Committee.

Grants - £500 - £5,000

Each year the Council has a budget for larger grants and invites applications for projects that meet its grant criteria. The deadline for applications is October for payment in April the following year. This allows the Council to build the commitment into its budget calculations for the next financial year.

Communication Strategy and Petitions Policy

As part of Nantwich Town Council's efforts to improve the democratic process and involvement of residents in the decision making process it has recently introduced a Petitions Policy.

In addition, to complement this policy, the Council have also created a Community Engagement Strategy, which seeks to ensure that the many communities in Nantwich have a voice in the debate around improving the delivery of local services and thus having a positive impact on life and work in the Town.

The Nantwich Foodbank was set up in 2012 and is part of the Trussell Trust which is a nationwide network of food banks.

They provide emergency food and support to people locked in poverty, and with the support of the Trust campaign for change to end the need for food banks in the UK.



Last year they faced an unprecedented increase in demand for food support. In the year ending March 2021 they distributed parcels for 1348, supporting 3796 people,1,555 of which were children. This is an increase of 151% caused largely by surge in demand owing to the COVID-19 crisis. Low income remains the most common reason for individuals and families needing support and adults 25-64 were the largest group supported.

Although there has been a reduction of the numbers of people needing support in recent months, there has been a notable percentage increase in the number of children needing support and young families. The Foodbank have strong relationships with referral agents and work closely with them in order to ensure that our clients have the correct support in place.

The summer months will be busy with a growing number of school age children needing support over the holiday period. Further to this, there may be an expected increase in demand as a result of changes to the Universal Credit scheme and the end of the furlough.

None of what they do would be possible without amazing volunteers who talk with our clients, collect donations, pack food parcels, sack and deliver food support. They are the Foodbank. This team don't only pack food parcels, they put great effort into catering for specific needs such as family make-up, childrens favourites, and dietary needs and requirements. They offer so much more than food, they are a lifeline to many.

Nantwich Foodbank wishes to thank the people of Nantwich, your generosity and support of those less fortunate truly demonstrates what community really means.

How You Can Help?

Nantwich Foodbank relies on your goodwill and support. Over 90% of the food distributed by Foodbanks is donated by the public – that's why your food donations are absolutely vital to our ability to give everyone referred to us a balanced and nutritious seven-day supply of food.

Nantwich Museum Re-opens with major Summer Exhibition

Nantwich Museum has re-opened to the public with a view to returning to full opening hours as soon as possible, namely Tuesday to Saturday 10.30am – 4.30pm. Prospective visitors are advised to check opening hours and availability before visiting. The Dementia Friendship Group, which meets on specified Monday afternoons, resumed in June and it is anticipated Walking Tours of the town will be available during the summer.

Regular income streams, including the shop, education activities for schools, town tours and outreach activities through which the Museum generates much of its income have been severely curtailed by the pandemic, although the online shop and a series of successful webinars have offset some of the loss. Meanwhile "Nantwich Digital Museum" on Facebook and Twitter have

played a significant part in keeping the Museum active.

"Ouch! A slightly horrible history of health and disease in Nantwich" is an exhibition prepared by the Museum's Research Group taking visitors on a quirky whistle-stop journey into Nantwich's past from around the 17th to the early 20th century. What was the most common type of fatal accident in 17th century Nantwich? How did the townspeople cope with everyday health problems and frequent outbreaks of contagious and often fatal disease? What type of home remedies did people rely upon who were unable to afford the treatments provided by health professionals or sold by apothecaries? The exhibition concludes on an encouraging note with an appreciation of today's National Health Service.









Planning for 2022

Although this year's Nantwich Food Festival has been cancelled due to uncertainty regarding COVID-19 restrictions and guidelines, it does not mean the organising committee has not been busy. With work already underway for the 2022 festival.

Bookings from some past exhibitors have already been secured and we are also looking at introducing some new features for next year. We have also retained many of our voluntary helpers but could always do with more.

Even without the festival, the committee have been in regular contact with both our local and

our celebrity chefs in readiness for next year. It is particularly pleasing to see that two of our local chefs have featured in TV cookery programmes and we hope to see them demonstrate some of their winning dishes at the next festival. Oli Mannion successfully progressed to the semi-final stage on The Best Home Cook and Stuart Collins showed his cookery prowess in becoming the Central region champion on the Great British Menu.

The last two years has seen the emergence of many local food enterprises, widening the range of food choices for residents, and the festival organisers are looking at how we can work with those businesses during the 2022 festival weekend.

Our work supporting the Nantwich Food Bank has continued and it was particularly pleasing that Nantwich Food Festival volunteer, Maureen Coulter who organises the food bank 'Drop off and Go' events using festival volunteers has had her support recognised by the town Mayor.

And they are coming back with a bang!


Nantwich Players Theatre reopens in July with a fierce comedy written by Joanna Murray–Smith, Female of the Species.

The Beam Heath Trust 2021


Along with other organisations it has been another difficult year for Trustees to conduct the business of The Beam Heath Estate. There has only been three attended meetings since March 2020. Almost all The Trusts business has had to be administered by email or telephone.

The 2020 Dividend of £40 was set aside to be incorporated into the 2021 payment. Trustees are pleased to say the total for both years is now £80 for existing recipients and distribution started in June.

For new applicants, Claims Day is scheduled for 29th September. Should it be necessary to amend this date, prior notice will be given in the local media.

The criteria for qualification for the Dividend will be published as usual when Claims Day is finally announced. New applicants must reside in the ancient boundary of the town. This can only be ascertained by personal presentation on Claims Day.

The 1823 act, which The Trustees have to abide by, could never have foreseen the way that traditional banking that has developed over recent years. The relentless movement towards high tech, on-line, cashless transactions could impact on how future Dividends are paid. Due to current regulations it may take longer than usual to visit everyone.

Nantwich Is Still Blooming

Nantwich in Bloom has been able to continue with its socially distanced working parties this year. The colourful summer planting in the town square is being completed by their volunteers helped by students from Reaseheath College with their Centenary bed. Displays of hanging baskets are as spectacular as ever, thanks to sponsorship by local businesses.

Look out for the Forget me not bed with the symbol of Dementia Friendly Nantwich outside the Library, and the continuing blue and yellow planting outside St Mary's Church. Also, one of the beds in the town square should trigger memories of home gardens from the past.

The North West in Bloom competition is resuming this year and Nantwich will be visited by the RHS judges on FRIDAY 30th JULY when we need everyone to ensure that the town will be looking at its best.

Nantwich In Bloom will also be awarding certificates to local businesses, shops

and pubs who have created floral displays outside their premises. These displays will be reviewed by the Mayor, assisted by Nantwich in Bloom members, at the end of July/early August so make sure that they are looking good!

Volunteers have worked very hard on Nantwich in Bloom's allotment to produce more plants for display in the town and maintain winter bedding plants during the summer as well as producing crops of vegetables. This is in addition to work in maintaining the Community Orchard and helping to renovate the Willow feature on Nantwich Riverside.

They have also continued to maintain the two 'Welcome to Nantwich beds', and the floral displays in beds and planters on Nantwich Railway Station where Nantwich in Bloom volunteers have painted all the planters grey and planted with a 'wheels' theme in red, silver and white. Nantwich Station was awarded a Highly Commended in Cheshire Best Kept Stations Special Awards for 2020.

Finally the team are running the decorated and planted pots projects with elderly peoples' homes on the topic 'Times gone by' and for primary schools, of 'Grow your Own' and are looking forward to seeing the results.

Launch of Rotary Community Raffle


