

How is the Town Council Financed?

In 2020/21 approximately half of the Town Councils expended funds came from a precept which is added to the Council Tax levy set by the Principal Authority. In 2020/21 the precept was £673,005.

Below is a summary of the income and expenditure for the year ending 31 March 2021. The funds are spend providing services and representing the people of Nantwich. In broad terms, in 2020/21 the Town Council spent the money raised on the following:

Services Provided

Nantwich Town Council is one of the largest of the 108 town and parish councils in Cheshire East. The Town Council provides the most local tier of government for Nantwich.

It serves the local community by:

- Providing an essential link between town residents and Cheshire East Borough Council to ensure grass roots views are heard and considered:
- Encourages economic development and regeneration of the town:
- Examining Planning and Licensing applications and giving opinions to the Borough Council on behalf of local residents;
- Providing financial support to a variety of community groups and organisations which support the well-being of Nantwich residents.
- Managing a range of local services and facilities to benefit Nantwich includina:
 - * CCTV The Town Council pays for the provision and upgrade of the CCTV around the town which is managed by Cheshire East Council.
 - * Allotments The Town Council provides four allotment sites at Brookfield 1, Brookfield 2, Wellington Road and Welshman's Lane.
 - * Indoor Market Which operates from the Market Hall on Market Street, and is open every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.
 - * Seasonal outdoor markets Including regular Farmer's Market, Artisan markets, Spring, Summer, Autumn and Winter markets throughout the year.
 - * Brookfield Hall Community rooms Large and small rooms for hire.
 - * Civic Hall Since the transfer of the Civic Hall from Cheshire East Council in 2012, the Town Council has worked hard to upgrade the fabric and facilities and now has a thriving community venue. As the Town Council supports community use for a large proportion of available hire, financially the Civic is running at an operational loss. However, since 2012 until the pandemic of 2020 the loss has reduced year on year due to a busy events calendar most weekends with sell out shows and a licensed bar to ensure it provides good value for the residents of Nantwich.
 - * Public Conveniences, Market Street Provision of male and female toilets, and a changing place facility for disabled users. The toilets are cleaned and maintained by the Town Council and are considered a key service to the visiting and local community.

Key Achievements

Some of the memorable achievements and progress on the Town Council's Corporate objectives of 2020-21 were:

THEME ONE: Planning a sustainable future for our town

- Public consultation on the Town Council's first Corporate Plan
- Approved the new Corporate Plan for 2020-2023
- Developed a town promotional video to help the town's recovery after the first lockdown
- Revised the Allotment Management Policy
- Approved the Town Council's Plastic Reduction Policy and supported the objectives of Plastic Free Nantwich
- Responded to Cheshire East consultation on local transport and parking plans
- Responded to Cheshire East's Corporate Plan consultation
- Considered and gave feedback on xxx planning applications
- Representation of the Town Council on the Area Highway Group to discuss the winter maintenance service.

THEME TWO: Work with others to preserve and promote local arts

- Continued financial support of the Museum
- Funded the coverage of CCTV in the town and supported Pub Watch
- Reviewed the current provision of public toilets and began feasibility study on the former Snowhill site
- Refurbished the War Memorial
- Looked for opportunities to enhance Nantwich Market through promotional video, and Christmas competition.

THEME THREE: Continuing to develop and learn as an organisation

- Introduced new HR policies and appraisal system
- Worked towards the Local Council Award Gold accreditation
- Developed a 3/5-year maintenance plan for current street furniture and council owned land (including allotments)
- Developed and launched a new look, accessible website
- Encouraged the engagement of the public in Council meetings (through attendance and public speaking) with increased attendance through the medium of Zoom.

THEME FOUR: Supporting people, groups and organisations to help create and maintain a thriving community

- Delivered the Community Grants Scheme for local organisations within Nantwich
- Worked with volunteers and stakeholders to create a therapy community garden, donating an allotment at the Brookfield site and having councillor representatives on the working group.
- Supported the work of Nantwich in Bloom
- Worked in partnership with the NHS to create a COVID-19 vaccination centre at the Civic Hall

THEME FIVE: Delivering more services locally to meet the needs and aspirations of our community

- Worked with Market Traders to develop an agreed market stall pricing policy
- Worked with Allotment Holders to develop an agreed allotment rent Policy

Key Priorities for 2021/22

- Help Nantwich community recover from the pandemic through partnership enabling and working
- Seek to extend and improve our floral display through continued support of Nantwich in Bloom
- Ensure the cleanliness of the town centre remains at a high standard by
- Investing in additional resources with the introduction of a Town Ranger
- In areas where there is a high percentage of take away restaurants to work with the owners to ensure that surrounding streets are regularlypatrolled, and extraneous litter is collected, working with Cheshire East ensuring they meet their obligations
- Carry out repairs and improvements to The Pillory
- Seek to extend the CCTV provision
- Work with community organisations to support events, activities and volunteer programmes across the town and continue to develop the Town Council's events programme, including street entertainment
- Promote small grants scheme within Nantwich sports clubs and community groups and associations
- Review how tourism can be better supported through partnership working
- Consider the development of a Tourism Strategy
- Increase awareness of Comfort Scheme
- Investigate feasibility to introduce live stream meetings
- Complete feasibility study on the former Snowhill site
